The Problem:

A child who can play, is his own therapist (Pim v/d Pol). This essential role of play in child development is under thread, because more and more children cannot find into free play by themselves (multicausal play deprivation).

The Solution:

Building a bridge between structured activity based youth work and facilitating free play so youth workers can support children through the steps they are missing.

The Result:

Children find their ability to find into their own play and transfer this skill to similar loose parts environments& to playing outside in general. Youth workers are aware of their specific play setting and use playwork strategies such as risk benefit analysis to navigate them and support the play development of the children they are working with. Hereby they also take the environment of the children into account.
